BILL #	BRIEF DESCRIPTION	PRIMARY SPONSOR	STATUS
NHRS-RELATED BILLS			
HB 110	This bill requires that the cost to the retirement system of preparing statutorily required fiscal analysis of proposed legislation be reimbursed to NHRS by the state. These costs relate mainly to actuarial fees. A non-germane amendment (am-1941s) related to the applicability of HB 116 (below) has been added to the bill by the Senate.	Rep. Katherine Rogers	6/13/19: House, on a voice vote, concurred with Senate amendment (am-1941s). The bill will be enrolled and sent to the Governor.
HB 116	This bill changes the method for determining the proper NHRS membership classification of state "correctional line personnel" as defined in RSA 100-A.	Rep. Carol McGuire	5/23/19: Senate, on a voice vote, accepted committee recommendation of ought to pass (OTP). The bill has been enrolled and sent to the Governor.
HB 418	This bill modifies the "grandfathering" provision for retirees working part-time for NHRS participating employers on January 1, 2019.	Rep. David Danielson	4/11/19: Senate, on a voice vote, accepted committee recommendation of inexpedient to legislate (ITL). The bill is dead.
HB 468	This bill, as passed by the House, classifies annual attendance stipends or bonuses as earnable compensation for NHRS provided that they are paid pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement, personnel policy, or other agreement applicable to substantially all employees and the amount of which is determined by reference to the amount of sick days an employee used in the calendar or fiscal year. Under current law, such cash awards are not treated as earnable compensation. A Senate amendment (am-2040s) enables summer adjunct wages earned by full-time community college faculty to be included as earnable compensation.	Rep. Peter Schmidt	6/13/19: House, on a voice vote, concurred with Senate amendment (am-2040s). The bill will be enrolled and sent to the Governor.
HB 497	This bill requires the state to pay 15 percent of employer contributions for teachers, police officers and firefighters employed by political subdivisions beginning in fiscal year 2020.	Rep. Renny Cushing	3/13/19: House Finance Committee voted to retain the bill in committee, 22-0. No further action expected this session.
HB 616	This bill grants a 1.5% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) on the first \$50,000 of the pension benefit to retirees who retired on or before July 1, 2014, or any beneficiary of such member who is receiving a pension benefit. The COLA would take effect on the retired member's first anniversary date occurring after July 1, 2020.	Rep. Diane Schuett	5/23/19: Senate, on a roll call vote, accepted committee recommendation of ought to pass (OTP), 12-11. The bill has been enrolled and sent to the Governor.

HB 629	This bill establishes a defined contribution state retirement plan for new members of the retirement system who begin service on or after July 1, 2019.	Rep. Carol McGuire	3/7/19: House, on a roll call vote, accepted committee recommendation of inexpedient to legislate (ITL), 224-137. The bill is dead.
HB 675	This bill modifies the cost calculation methodologies for the purchase of service credit in the retirement system for active service in the armed forces prior to NHRS membership and in cases of employer enrollment oversight.	Rep. Kris Schultz	5/15/19: Signed into law by the Governor. Chapter 38, Laws of 2019. Effective 7/14/19.
HB 720	This bill allows a retired faculty member of the community college system to begin part-time employment prior to 28 days after retirement.	Rep. Mel Myler	2/28/19: House, on a voice vote, accepted committee recommendation of inexpedient to legislate (ITL). The bill is dead.
SB 28	This bill adds an active NHRS member to the NHRS Independent Investment Committee as a non-voting committee member. The member would be appointed by the Governor from a list of nominations provided by public employee labor organizations.	Sen. Kevin Cavanaugh	6/5/19: Signed into law by the Governor. Chapter 61, Laws of 2019. Effective 8/4/19.
